TRANSITIONS TO SCHOOL

Last Thursday at Tainui Full Primary, we had our very first Transitions to School hui for 2021. We were able to pick up from where we left in 2020 and really reflect and unpack the question:

"What makes a successful transition to school's programme?"

We had representatives from our punanga Te Ara Metua and Ra Itu as well as our transition teachers from Mangakino school, Tainui Full Primary, Strathmore and Amisfield school. A massive ngā mihi to you all for coming and sharing your knowledge with our roopu.

Some key messages that we listened to were:

- Making connections with whānau is an important element. Teaching practice from Te Ara Metua was shared and we got to see a snippet of a transition to school profile that they use to give to both whānau and teachers in their new schools.
- Sharing about a child with a principal can be extremely powerful too. Ra Itu use this approach to share information as well as strategies that they have used that has worked for the transitioning learners.
- A sharing of resources across our spaces would be awesome. The idea of a resource that had Cook Island Māori waiata and beats so that our schools /other ECE had the same waiata for the purpose of creating a feeling/ a sense of home for our tamariki was discussed.
- The autonomy we have within our schools/ centres is what our whānau chooses when they enrol
 them into a learning space. Sharing of practise and resources across our Kāhui Ako community will
 help us to create a space of continuation- and it is best for all of our tamariki. We are not in a
 competition with each other. We are working together to create strong hearts, strong minds and a
 strong community.

Our next hui is all about collaboration.

It is a space where educators can come, share GOLD, listen to ways of being and take elements that they see fit into their own school/ centre's strategic goals. This will be held at the following:

Purpose: Sharing of practice. The Ark will have the opportunity to share their GOLD and show us around their spaces. This is an opportunity to meet new educators, form connections and share awesome practise and resources.
